Community Effort Saves Misty Of Chincoteague Ranch From Development

A grassroots effort to preserve the lower Eastern Shore's famed Beebe Ranch as a museum has paid off. The Museum of Chincoteague officially bought the ranch property from the Beebe family, saving it from likely being developed. The Beebe Ranch is the setting for Misty of Chincoteague, a 1974 book about a Chincoteague pony that became a six-book series selling over 5 million copies.

When the Beebe family decided earlier this year to sell the ranch due to aging family members and the challenges of keeping it up, the property almost went to a developer for an offered \$625,000.

But the ranch continues to be popular with tourists and fans of the Misty series, who come to tour the property. The Beebes hoped the Museum of

Chincoteague could match the \$625,000 offer, and in February, a fundraising mission began.



It seemed like an ambitious goal to reach. When Bay Bulletin wrote about the museum's efforts Feb. 28, they had raised just \$35,000.

As the museum posted on its GoFundMe page, "If we can raise the funds in what can only be called a colossal, grassroots effort, we can preserve the ranch for future generations, keep a treasured part of Chincoteague intact and support the mission of the museum to protect our history, making the Beebe Ranch an officially an extension of the museum."

Since then, a host of creative fundraisers have been launched to benefit the "Save the Beebe Ranch" fund. Chincoteague pony collectibles have been sold. A couple of local girls sold their hand-painted decorative shells on the island and donated their proceeds. The Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company, which auctions ponies at the beloved Chincoteague Pony Swim each year, held a special auction to benefit the museum's ranch fund.

Bay pinto filly #29, born around April 24, 2023, went up for auction June 9-14 as a buyback, meaning the pony would be donated back to the volunteer fire company and the proceeds would go to the Beebe Ranch fund. The auction ended up setting a pony buyback record at \$40,500. The filly was given the honorary name of Beebe's Perfect Storm.

Pushing the fundraiser within striking distance was a generous donation from island resident and local philanthropist, David Landsberger. He offered a \$100,000 matching grant challenge.

On June 30, the museum was able to officially buy the ranch. They say Billy Beebe and his sister Barbara Gray called the sale a "dream come true".

"Selling the Beebe Ranch to the Museum of Chincoteague, protecting it for the future, was something that their mother had been talking about many years ago and now it has happened!" the museum posted on Facebook.

Thousands of individuals, both local and from around the country, donated to the fund. Now, the museum says, the planning begins to determine how the 10-acre ranch property and the Beebe's original home will be displayed to the public.

VA Relaxes Crab Catch Limits, MD Keeps Tighter Limits


When the results of last winter's blue crab population survey in the Maryland and Virginia portions of Chesapeake Bay showed some encouraging results, some wondered if it would lead to increased catch limits for commercial watermen. Well, yes and no.

The Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC), which significantly cut bushel limits in the face of last year's numbers, approved a modest increase for some commercial watermen.

At the same time, Maryland's fisheries regulators announced last week they would stick with the catch limits set last year after record low population numbers led to sharp cutbacks. But they will allow a slight increase in the number of female crabs that could be harvested and lifted limits entirely over Labor Day weekend, when the demand increases sharply.

Genine McClair, the blue crab program manager for Maryland's Department of Natural Resources (DNR), reasoned that while the male crab population increased over the last year, it remains below average. At the same time, the winter dredge survey showed low numbers of juveniles for several consecutive years, she said.

The catch limits would remain in place to "maintain a similar level of conservation as last year," she said in a statement.



He noted that commercial operations did better than expected last year and said watermen had hoped for at least a slight increase in the bushel limits this year, given the encouraging results of the winter survey.

"It could have been worse," he conceded, but at the same time, "we were looking for a little bit more.

In Virginia, where bushel limits are based on the size of the crabbing operation, VMRC did not allow the smallest operations any increase but granted mid-sized operators one additional bushel per day. It allowed the largest operators—those licensed to use up to 425 pots—a nine-bushel increase, from 27 to 36 bushels per day.

VMRC spokesman Zach Widgeon said the regulations "protect the entire stock but make the reductions more equitable" among the different kinds of license holders. They might "result in a slight increase in harvest in 2023," but they will create "equitable reductions for all pot license types," he wrote.

Chris Moore, a Chesapeake Bay Foundation scientist based in Virginia, said in a statement that the changes "help ensure more equitable harvest limits for crabbing operations of all sizes while maintaining most of the conservation benefits adopted last year."

He warned, however, that while the "modest rise in the Bay's blue crab number is encouraging, numerous concerns remain about the blue crab population" and that Virginia and "other Bay jurisdictions should continue to manage crab harvests cautiously."

Way South Chesapeake Fishing Report, July 7 Update:

Fishing opportunities are endless in this region of the Bay during the summer months and many anglers are taking advantage of those opportunities. Speckled trout and puppy drum are popular targets for those searching the shallows. We heard from an angler who hit the Elizabeth



River who caught two slot drum and had a few other big fish break him off. Another angler fishing the Elizabeth managed to catch 10 speckled trout, 6 small flounder, and 10 sea bass. Many different species of fish are available to catch in the rivers and inlets. You just have to get out and wet a line for them.

Virginia Beach Sport Fishing says that there are a lot of cobia around right now. The majority of the cobia still seem to be staging around the CBBT waiting for water temperatures to rise enough for them to make a push north. Anglers in this region of the bay are doing very well while both sight fishing and bait fishing. A reader wrote in to give us the lowdown after heading out on a charter in search of cobia out of Cape Charles. They fished from nine in the morning until three in the afternoon focusing solely on sight fishing for cobia and during the trip they boated six cobia, but only one keeper that came in just over 40 inches. The other fish were all 30 to 38 inches. He also mentioned that they casted at close to 25 cobia but that most of the fish seemed uninterested in their baits. The bull reds will also be in the same areas as the cobia but the islands near the CBBT have been a hotspot as of late. Most boats are dropping down cut bait or live lining small croaker. Reports indicate there is a good night bite happening and fishing with a moving tide has produced more bites.

Another popular option around the CBBT this time of year are sheepshead. The sheeps are mainly targeted at the pilings of the bridge tunnel but can be caught at any submerged structure or reef. They tend to hold tight to structure and are more active around the tide swings. Sweeper style jigs paired with fiddler crabs is what typically gets them biting. One angler fishing in an unspecified area of the southern Bay checked in after an epic sheepshead trip. Their boat landed 23 with many of them meeting citation status. We are lucky to have some world class fishing for this fishery so make sure to take advantage of the local opportunities.

Last Month's Mystery Fish Sea Bream



gilthead The sea bream, or fish in bream, is а marine Located Sparidae family. predominately in the Mediterranean Sea, the fish is sometimes referred to as 'Dorada' in Mediterranean countries like Italy. In the realm of cooking, this type of bream is widely considered the most delicious in the family.

Sea breams are technically omnivores, as they will sometimes feed on sea plants and plant matter. However, they are mostly carnivorous, feasting on small crustaceans, such as shrimp.

The sea bream is in abundance in the Mediterranean Sea and Southern Europe and has a population in the Atlantic Ocean also. They exist both in groups and as lone rangers, swimming through seagrass beds. They are also frequently found in estuaries.

The sea bream is not typically a deep-sea fish, as it tends to range between depths of 0-30 meters. However, they have been known to delve as deep as 150 meters.

Sea bream has an interesting approach to sexual reproduction. During their earlier years, from birth to 2 years, they are male but gradually turn into females in the third year. They are hermaphrodites. Once eggs are fertilized, they grow into their larval stage. This stage lasts around 50 days.




Fishing Around the World

SEA FISHING IN FRANCE


Whether you are alone, with friends or family, sea fishing in France is for many a great opportunity to discover or rediscover french marine richness during holidays.

But diversity of fish and environments are often a problem when choosing a suitable area for sea fishing holidays in France or for selecting an appropriate sea fishing technique. What fish could I find? Where? What fishing techniques Which fishing equipment to use? There are so many questions you can ask when you go for sea fishing, whatever your level is.

From 64 (either direction) take the Mercury Blvd exit towards the James River Bridge (West) stay in the right hand lane and turn right at the light onto Todds Lane. Go past Zaxby's chicken about 400 ft and the driveway to the church is on the right. The original St, Mark's sign is still on the lawn just short of the driveway with a new Baptist church message.

If you come to the traffic light at the intersection of Cunningham you went to far. Turn right on Cunningham and look for the Cunningham entrance to the church (500ft). If you miss it you will need to do a U-turn on Cunningham and go left onto Todds Lane.

The church driveway is just short of the Bercuese Funeral home entrance or just after it if coming from Cunningham.
